

IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENT FROM ABET. INC.

The following announcement is an important decision reached by the American Board of Forensic Toxicology, Inc., at a recent board meeting held Dec. 16, 1977 in Atlanta, Georgia. The action taken by the Board dealt with Section 5a. of requirements.

The temporary waiver of the doctoral degree has been extended until December 31, 1978. Thus for the period ending December 31, 1978, the requirement of earned Ph.D. degree and post doctural experience are waived for otherwise qualified applicants who posess:

1) An earned baccalaureate or higher degree in, one of the natural sciences from an institution acceptable to the board, and

2) at least six years of full time post baccalaureate experience (or part time equivalent thereof) in forensic toxicology acceptable to the Board (which may include graduate education acceptable to the Board).

Other action by the Board was to elect officers and board members for the coming year. Discussion also centered about plans for recertification. More detailed reports from the Board were not available as of publication date.
