Abstract

Forensic toxicologists play a critical role in the intersection of science and law, specializing in the application of scientific principles to analyze, detect, and quantify the presence of alcohol and/or drugs in biological samples. In court, they discuss not only the accuracy and reliability of these results, but also educate the judge and jury on how the detected substances may have impacted an individual's driving abilities and behavior. This session will discuss the role of the forensic toxicologist as an expert witness in impaired driving investigations, including the interpretation of both driving under the influence of alcohol and driving under the influence of other drugs. Attendees will hear from both forensic toxicologists and attorneys. The toxicologists will separate alcohol only and DUID case testimony incorporating ASB standards 122 and 037. Two highly regarded TSRPs will discuss the testimony of a forensic toxicologist from the attorney's perspective. Finally, the workshop will conclude with an interactive case presentation to include the audience and the entire panel of experts.

Learning Objectives

 Attendees will learn about providing expert testimony in alcohol-related DWI cases, including what can and cannot be testified to, as well as the necessary information for conducting ethanolspecific calculations.

- 2. Attendees will gain an understanding of expert testimony in a drug-related DWI cases, focusing on interpreting toxicological results in DUID cases and educating the judge and jury on the potential effects of the identified drugs.
- Attendees will gain insight into effective techniques for interpreting and presenting toxicology
 results in court from an attorney's perspective, covering what types of testimony are typically
 persuasive to a jury and which may be less effective.
