Regional Toxicology Liaisons Program Overview

The RTL program aims to strengthen state toxicology programs by improving support, communication, and resources. We also coordinate with the criminal justice system, speed up toxicology sample processing, and enhance data reporting.

The RTLs focus on training, collaboration, and standardizing testing across state labs. We help improve data reporting so we can get a clearer picture of the drug-impaired driving issue.

We support toxicologists, traffic safety resource prosecutors, judicial outreach liaisons, law enforcement, and state highway safety offices across multiple regions and states.

By attending conferences and staying involved with various organizations, we keep a pulse on the latest in toxicology—emerging drug trends, advancements in testing technology, or the challenges facing labs. This also allows us to connect with key partners in each state, including judges, TSRPs, DREs, Highway Safety Office reps, victim advocates, law enforcement, and data analysts.

The RTLs have expanded into new spaces through these connections, providing education and training on workflow, testing processes, and other toxicology challenges. At the same time, gaining a better understanding of their roles allows us to help toxicology personnel see the bigger picture of their impact.

The program provides support, training, collaboration, and key insights to help drive impaired driving initiatives forward. The following is a breakdown of the January to March 2025 RTL activities.

Supporting U.S. Government Forensic Toxicology Laboratories

The four RTLs work as a cohesive team and meet weekly to address the challenges and barriers to comprehensive testing in government-funded toxicology laboratories and provide support. Virtual – Wednesdays at 10:00 AM CT.

With the expansion of the RTL Program, the focus has been on establishing connections in the added states. Much of our work includes engaging with state TSRPs, participating in state DUI Taskforces, and assessing laboratories' status and needs in these regions.

The RTLs receive several questions and inquiries. To streamline the process of requesting information from all laboratories, the RTLs have implemented a weekly email to compile responses to questions and provide updates on upcoming training opportunities.

Below are some of the key activities recently completed:

All RTLs

The RTLs have developed a system for collecting information for the laboratories across our regions that allows all to view the data requested. Specifically, in May we have been asked to collect information on the following topics (May 19, 2025, May 27, 2025):

- Method validation plans and validation documentation
- Tube preference if grey tops are unavailable (Impaired Driving Blood Collection Kits)
- Organizational Scientific Area Committee (OSAC) Implementation
- Eppendorf Automated Liquid Handling System
- New Building/Lab Resource Group
- Hydrogen generator for HS-GC/FIDs (Used for Alcohol Testing)
- Implementation of ASB 054: Standard for a Quality Control Program in Forensic Toxicology Laboratories
- Third-party vendors for service contracts for LCMSMS or QTOF systems
- Instrument donations to academic programs
- High-resolution mass spectrometry (HRMS) drug screening methods
- Information on companies providing glassware calibration

The Kentucky lab requested testimony training from the RTLs. Thirty toxicologists attended the one day training in Frankfort, KY. Great discussions occurred amongst the attendees which includes drug testimony, courtroom experiences, questions for the TSRP and JOL.

Northeast

The New England Association of Toxicologists (NEAT) annual meeting occurred and Dr. Jones plays a vital role in creating the schedule, determining the topics for the meeting content and presenting. This meeting includes labs and individuals that not only perform forensic toxicology testing but drug chemistry analysis as well.

Dr. Jones played a key role in planning, presenting and chairing the poster session for the Current Trends in Forensic Toxicology Conference (virtual). There were over 1800 attendees from all over the globe. She also worked with the Kentucky laboratory to plan and execute a one day testimony training with 30 attendees.

Midwest

A lab in Illinois has received approval to purchase a Quadrupole Time of Flight Tandem Mass Spectrometer (QToF). Ms. Miles has been connecting the lab with others that have similar instrumentation and from the same manufacturer. In addition, discussions have begun about how the lab will implement standards related to QToF testing. Ms. Miles continues to work with labs in Ohio to convene a partnership meeting. It has been difficult as not all labs are responding, however, a few have and planning will begin and efforts will continue to include all Ohio labs.

Ms. Miles presented at the Midwest Association of Toxicology and Therapuetic Drug Monitoring (MATT). An overview of the RTL program was provided and information on how to track drug trends and ensure the scope of testing in DUID is all encompassing. Ms. Miles and Mr. Heartsill presented a one day testimony training during the International Association of Chemical Testing (IACT) and provide a separate session on the RTL program and updates.

Mid-South

Mr. Heartsill has continued to work with the newly added labs in his region. Texas and Oklahoma labs have been in communication with him and he is working through their needs and requests. Dallas County requested in-person training on standardization and published standards. Tarrant County Medical Examiner's Office requested an in-person visit to assess the lab's needs and introduce the RTL program.

The Kansas Bureau of Investigation Toxicology Laboratory requested a meeting to work through the uncertainty of measurement (UM) process. UM is a complicated process of determining variance in an analytical method. This meeting provided insight to the laboratory on what to change to improve their current measurement processes and brought them into better compliance with international standards for an upcoming assessment

In addition to the laboratory meetings with Texas, Kansas and Oklahoma, Mr. Heartsill played a key role in the IACT conference. Not only did he provide training with Ms. Miles, he also presented in half day workshop on ANSI/ASB 122 regarding the use of alcohol calculations to estimate the Blood Alcohol Concentration.

Mr. Heartsill presented in a webinar sponsored by AAFS Connect promoting the use of standards, particularly ASB BPR 122, the alcohol calculations document. This webinar had over **500 people** signed up with over **300 in actual attendance**. **Nine different countries** were represented and included toxicologists, prosecutors, and judges from across the Nation. It was a very interactive presentation and included engagement from many of the participants with the Q&A session lasting past the time allotted for the webinar.

Western

A lab in Arizona requested specific technical assistance in dealing with testing for mitragynine (Kratom). Ms. Burke reached out to labs in California that she knows test for this drug to facilitate conversations to assist the Arizona lab. A particular lab in California discussed the potential for them to reach all of the labs in the state to provide assistance where necessary.

Several other labs requested technical assistance with testing capabilities and testing. Ms. Burke either assisted them herself or reached out to other labs for further support.

Supporting U.S. State Highway Safety Offices, Departments of Transportation

The RTLs strive to have continued engagement in traffic safety conferences and regional meetings, and impaired driving task forces have been a high priority. This engagement maintains a focus on toxicology and includes:

All RTLs

The RTLs organized a webinar for the laboratories to meet TrisAnn Jodon and learn more about FARS and the laboratory data's impact on that system and overall data. Approximately 200 people attended and have viewed the webinar and several labs have reached out with questions about how they can be incorporated into their state's FARS program.

Northeast

North Carolina's SHSO requested a follow up meeting to the initial NHTSA Impaired Driving Stakeholders meeting. Dr. Jones convened the labs, law enforcement, SHSO, and other key partners in traffic safety. The group revisited the outcomes from the initial meeting, set goals for moving forward, and increased communication between the labs and the traffic safety partners.

Maine held a AAA summit and requested Dr. Jones present to the group. There were 30-35 attendees and the topic was an overview of the RTL program. Dr. Jones also attended the Maine Impaired Driving Task Force meeting and provided information about the RTL program.

<u>Midwest</u>

Worked with Ms. Burke and Michigan to draft informational testimony to be included in the Michigan legislative hearings on an oral fluid bill. Also presented for the Transportation Research Board (TRB) on oral fluid, both roadside devices and lab-based testing. Approximately 90 people attended the presentation.

Mid-South

Mr. Heartsill presented on the RTL program to the Texas DUI Forum and has participated in the impaired driving task forces for Texas, Missouri, Oklahoma and Iowa.

Western

Several meetings occurred with R9 representatives to coordinate traffic safety initiatives and other ways to support the toxicology programs. Included in this effort was discussing the New Mexico lab and looking to address state-specific needs. Participation in the California Impaired Driving Task Force has been beneficial to ensure toxicology is represented in the meetings.

Supporting U.S. Judicial System and Drug Court Teams

Providing training to the judiciary has proved to be a valuable contribution to the RTL Program. This group is responsible for making decisions in toxicology related cases and has historically lacked toxicology training. Engagement with this community spans from criminal trial judges to treatment court judges, prosecutors, and other partners in the DUID and drug related investigation process. Recent engagement includes:

All RTLs

The National Traffic Law Center (NTLC) has requested the RTLs re-write their Alcohol Toxicology for Prosecutors Monograph. The rewrite will be significant as many updates are required. The RTLs have met with the NTLC several times. Work continues on the monograph.

The American Bar Association (ABA) held a webinar in May for judges. The topic was the fundamentals of forensic toxicology and all of the RTLs participated.

Northeast

The NTLC held a webinar on the Smith v Arizona SCOTUS decision. Dr. Joes provided a presentation from the forensic toxicology perspective to provide an understanding of the difference between drug chemistry testing and workflows and toxicology. She also presented for the Pennsylvania DUI Association meeting on the topic of drugs, alcohol and impairment.

Midwest

Ms. Miles presented during two sessions at the annual AllRise conference. One session was an overview of the RTL program with approximately 30 attendees. The second was an overview of drug and alcohol pharmacodynamics and specifics about how forensic toxicologists interpret results in impaired driving casework. There were approximately 200 attendees.

Mid-South

The Kansas Judicial Conference requested a presentation from Mr. Heartsill on the use of toxicology results in the courtroom. Although the RTLs do not currently represent Wyoming, Mr. Heartsill attended their judicial conference to present, alongside the WY State Crime Lab and Judge Huffman (ABA Fellow). The WY training was deemed one of the best, if not the best, the state has ever had on this topic. The conference and training deepened current relationships and forged new contacts and relations in a currently unsupported area.

The Missouri SHSO invited Mr. Heartsill to present at their traffic safety conference. Topics included oral fluid testing and current drugs trending in forensic toxicology, impaired driving. Mr. Heartsill also met with the Iowa judiciary to begin planning for upcoming training sessions.

Western

In April, Ms. Burke traveled to Mississippi to present at their Drug Court Conference. Although Mississippi is not a state that is covered in the current RTL regions, the RTLs felt is was important to assist the state. Arizona also held a Drug Treatment Court Conference in April and Ms. Burke along with Dr. Jones provided presentations to this group.

The Arizona Deputy District Attorney specifically asked to meet with Ms. Burke to get information on the RTL program. The meeting provided specialized consultation on toxicology related issues. Ms. Burke provided details on her efforts to support the labs in Arizona.

Michigan requested testimony on an impending bill regarding oral fluid collection and testing. Ms. Burke drafted an informational statement, which she provided to the Michigan legislature during two different hearings. One was virtual, the other was in-person. Feedback from the information Ms. Burke provided was favorable, commenting on what a tremendous resource she is for the state.

Supporting Traffic Safety and other Partners

Other traffic safety partners include regional NHTSA offices, the Association of Transportation Safety Information Professionals (ATSIP) and conferences related to traffic safety. Engagement with these partners is critical to maintain current knowledge of issues, provide updates of the RTL Program, and provide training related to drug trends and toxicology issues. This support includes:

Northeast

Dr. Jones presented to the Ohio Probation Officer Training on the topic of forensic toxicology and how it relates and impacts their role as probation officers.

Midwest

As Program Manager, Ms. Miles meets monthly the NHTSA COR regarding the RTL program and gives updates and receives feedback. The Association of Traffic Safety Information Professionals (ATSIP) Impaired Driving Working Group (IDWG) meets monthly. Ms. Miles provides feedback on barriers for toxicology laboratories to readily provide impaired driving data. The ATSIP IDWG requested Ms. Miles

chair a Toxicology Sub Group (TSG) to focus on integrating toxicology data into the impaired driving dataset.

Mid-South

The Association of Ignition Interlock Program Administrators Conference was held in May and they requested Mr. Heartsill attend and present on drug trends and the impact if ignition interlock on cases that are DUID-related, which may also include alcohol. The TSRP from Florida has requested training from Mr. Heartsill and they are working together to plan for the content.

In June, the Midwest Crime Laboratory Meeting requested a presentation from Mr. Heartsill on the SCOTUS Smith v Arizona decision and its impact on forensic toxicology.

Western

In addition to her informational testimony for the Michigan legislature, Ms. Burke provided toxicology information to other traffic safety and legislative partners. While in Michigan, she met with a few legislators to help them understand the role of toxicology in impaired driving investigations and, specifically, how oral fluid impacts the process.

Supporting U.S. Standards Development in Forensic Toxicology

One of the major objectives of the RTL Program is to bring consistency to toxicology testing, testimony, laboratory accreditation, etc. The American Academy of Forensic Sciences, Academy Standards Board (ASB) is an American National Standards Institute (ANSI) accredited standards development organization. The Toxicology Consensus Body facilitates the development of standards, best practices, and guidance documents for forensic toxicology through the Organizational Scientific Area Committees (OSAC).

Dr. Jones and Mr. Heartsill have been intimately involved in standards development. Their involvement provides unique insight for the RTL program as we continue to encourage laboratories to implement standards. The activities at the end of the report demonstrates the time Dr. Jones and Mr. Heartsill spend on standards development.

The RTLs are planning a webinar series for labs looking to implement ANSI/ASB standards. This will occur in early 2026.

Support to the Society of Forensic Toxicologists (SOFT)

The involvement in the Society of Forensic Toxicologists (SOFT) allows the RTLs to interact with toxicologists from across the nation, developing a vast network of scientists who are able and willing to assist those labs and personnel in our regions with training, troubleshooting, instrument validation, and sharing of methods. That vast network is a critical missing factor in laboratories nationwide and has been a massive success in connecting people. Additionally, SOFT, and its annual conference, is the major provider of continuing education for the forensic toxicology community.

Several activities in the RTL report revolve around SOFT, the membership and its committees. The RTLs use SOFT as a platform for their webinars and other communications. Although many toxicologists are not members of SOFT, the RTLs are able to bridge that gap in their training and communications.

Support to the National Safety Council's Alcohol, Drugs, and Impairment Division (NSC-ADID)

The involvement in the National Safety Council Alcohol Drug and Impairment Division (ADID) serves a similar but different objective than that of SOFT. ADID, as a division of the National Safety Council (NSC), provides resources and information to NSC and the public through position statements, one-page training documents, and verbal consultation (NSC only). The RTLs are members of ADID. The ADID focuses on several projects, such as updating the *DUID laboratory testing recommendations*. In addition, the *Stop Testing Committee* examines the impact of laboratories implementing a limit on drug testing due to the Blood Alcohol Concentration (BAC). This committee has been beneficial in understanding the specific impact to the labs and the overall impact to highway safety and public health.

The ADID meets in person twice annually in conjunction with the Society of Forensic Toxicologists (SOFT) and the American Academy of Forensic Sciences (AAFS) annual meetings. The Executive Board meets once a year prior to the AAFS meeting. In the interim, the Officers hold meetings with NSC, the Executive Board, and various Section or Committee Chairs to review position statements or other documents for revision or publication. The RTLs hold various leadership positions within ADID.
